EMPLOYMENT AND BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

OBJECTIVE

By April 30, 2018, restore blighted downtown facades in Iola and Humboldt to create a thriving downtown by increasing usable space for building development and jobs. * Connect with Downtown business owners to determine which buildings are in need of repair.

* Coordinate volunteer group project to work on scraping, painting, reconstruction for facades.

* Participate in Downtown Action Team-Humboldt, both Chambers, Humboldt Pride and Community Involvement Task Force meetings as needed.

* Create training for new or existing business owners on building or maintaining a business.

* Develop a process that starts with façade development and ends in a new business.



PUBLIC SAFETY

By April 30, 2018, increase the number of residents who perceive their community to be safe by adding detection/shelter from severe weather, razing of condemned houses, and cleanup of dangerous outdoor debris.

SAFE AND CLEAN GREEN SPACES By April 30, 2018, decrease the community perception of a lack of safe, clean, accessible parks, trails, bike paths, and other infrastructure by improving the built environment. * City of Elsmore will have a storm warning system installed in their community.

*City of Mildred, with the assistance of Allen County Public Works, will pour concrete to set a donated storm shelter underground.

* The City of Laharpe will raze a condemned home and organize a large group project that will clean large debris from 5 resident homes.

* Create a systems change with all city councils so that when a condemed house is occupied, the city will provide resources for housing opportunities in our county to give to evicted residents.

* Create environmental changes that increase pedestrian and bike friendly communities in Humboldt on 9th street and Iola.

* Update Laharpe Park by adding playground equipment through a community service project.

* Construct a direct link between the Southwind Rail Trail and Lehigh Portland Trails.

* Construct a pedestrian bridge crossing Elm Creek that connects the city of Iola to Lehigh Portland Trails, Elm Creek Fishing Park, Connector trail to Southwind Rail Trail, and Iocal employment opportunities.

<image/> <section-header></section-header>	By April 30, 2018, Pass join an open use agreement with 3 different facilities in Allen County that allow for more opportunities for physical activity for residents.	 * Schedule meeting with elementary principals to discuss the open use agreements. * Promote open use of elementary schools in the neighborhoods where the elementary schools exist by adding signage. * Support Moran's physical activities goals by writing HCF ADG grant for exercise equipment, provide TA throughout the grant, increase community engagement, locate a place for exercise equipment, and create MOU for participating partners.
<image/> <section-header></section-header>	By April 30, 2018, improve student achievement by supporting the development of a comprehensive vocational technical center in Allen County for USD 256, 257, and 258.	 * Identify technical and financial needs of new vocational center. * Support Advisory Board with continued promotion and community engagement of upcoming classes as they develop. * Establish a student to workforce pathway by working with local businesses to determine certifications needed to secure job placement upon graduation. * Provide graduates with information on resources for business development and entrepreneurial opportunities.
